Kristine Clair Uchi Galano, also known as KayCee Galano, has performed concertos with orchestras in Europe, China, North America, and in her native Philippines. She won first prize at the 2021 Mary Lane Memorial



Violin Competition and was a prizewinner at the 2020 KF Wieniawski Violin Competition. She recently made her Carnegie Hall debut in October 2019, performing all six Bach solo sonatas. In 2018 she performed in the Philippines with the ABS-CBN Philharmonic Orchestra, performing Mozart's A major violin concerto and other works. She studies at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music with Kurt Sassmannshaus.

Today's Adjudicators

Eric Benjamin's earliest experiences with music still motivate him: Grieg's "In the Hall of the Mountain King" as heard in a sixth-grade music class in his native St. Albans, Vermont.

Participation in a school festival band (on baritone horn) prompted a decision to pursue classical music. At New England Conservatory of Music, he was able to study traditional and 12-tone harmony with jazz great Joe Maneri and observe the conducting of Gunther Schuller.



His career as a teacher and conductor began at Newton (MA) North High School. Teaching is one of his passions. In 1987 he returned to New England Conservatory to study orchestral conducting with Carl St. Clair. Further conducting studies took him to Gunther Schuller's Festival at Sandpoint (ID) and to Tanglewood, where he studied with Gustav Meier, Kurt Sanderling, Lukas Foss, and Leonard Bernstein.

A brief tenure as director of the Mozart Society Orchestra at Harvard University was curtailed by his acceptance of a position on the conducting staff of the Akron

Symphony, a position he held for 11 years. During that time, he served as director of the Akron Youth Symphony and appeared as guest conductor with the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra, Erie Philharmonic, Canton Symphony, Columbus Symphony, and numerous student festivals. He also acquired experience as a composer and arranger, with works performed by orchestras locally and across the nation. In 2017 he returned to the Akron Symphony as associate conductor.

In 1996, Eric became music director of the Tuscarawas Philharmonic, a position he still holds. He is adjunct faculty at Kent State University and at the University of Mount Union, where he directs the Alliance Symphony and teaches courses in conducting, composition and arranging.



Composer Andrew Rindfleisch has enjoyed a career in music that has also included professional activity as a conductor, pianist, vocalist, improviser, record producer, radio show host, and educator.

As a composer, he has produced nearly 80 works for the concert hall, including solo, chamber, vocal, orchestral, brass, wind, and choral music. His entire catalog is published by Manzo Music and his compositions can be heard on 12+ commercially released recordings.

He holds degrees from the University of Wisconsin at Madison (Bachelor of Music), the New England Conservatory of Music (Master of Music), and Harvard University (PhD).

As a conductor and producer, Mr. Rindfleisch's commitment to contemporary music has brought into performance and recording 500+ works by living composers during the past 30 years. He heads the music composition program at Cleveland State University.
